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

# Survey Shows 70.5 Million Members in LWF-Affiliated Churches



### **LWF 2011 Membership Figures**

### Slight Increase Globally with Growth in Africa and Asia

**GENEVA (LWI)** – The Lutheran World Federation (LWF) member churches continued to show slight growth globally in 2011, according to statistics gathered by the LWF Communion Office.

The 145 churches belonging to the LWF, ten recognized congregations and one recognized council in 79 countries had a combined total of 70,514,046 members, an increase of 205,752 or 0.3 percent over the previous year.

LWF churches in Africa and Asia mainly contributed to the growth, with Africa adding 658,752 new members (3.4 percent), and Asia 217,905 (2.5 percent), according to the 2011 annual statistical survey conducted by the LWF Office for Communication Services.

Churches in the North America, Europe, and Latin America and the Caribbean regions experienced decreases in membership. North America membership declined by 274,265 (5.8 percent), while in Europe membership dropped by 396,133 (around one percent) and in Latin America and the Caribbean the decrease was 507 members, 0.06 percent.

In 2011, membership of churches in the wider Lutheran family, which includes non-

LWF churches, rose by 196,667 to reach 74,192,243, representing an average increase of 0.3 percent according to the LWF survey.

Fifteen LWF member churches registered more than 1 million members. Among the largest churches are the Church of Sweden (6.5 million); Ethiopian Evangelical Church Mekane Yesus (5.84 million); Evangelical Lutheran Church in Tanzania (5.82 million); Evangelical Lutheran Church in Denmark (nearly 4.5 million); Evangelical Lutheran Church of Finland (over 4.3 million); Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (over 4.2 million); Protestant Christian Batak Church [Indonesia] (4.1 million); Church of Norway (over 3.8 million); and Malagasy Lutheran Church [Madagascar] (3 million); and the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Hanover [Germany] (2.9 million).

Germany continues to be the country with the highest numbers of members affiliated to Lutheran churches with 12.5 million, followed by the United States

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# LWF Leaders Urge Efforts to Enhance Religious and Community Co-existence in Nigeria

The Lutheran World Federation (LWF) strongly condemned the wave of violence against citizens and places of worship in Nigeria last December and January, and expressed its deep concern that such attacks undermined community co-existence and the expression of religious freedom.

Dozens of people were killed in attacks by extremists in the northern part of the country. Reports suggested they were led by the Boko Haram Islamist group, with at least one incident of retaliation.

"These heinous activities must be rejected by people of all religious convictions, civil society organizations and political groups," said LWF General Secretary Rev. Martin Junge in a 12 January statement.

He said the killings threatened peace and security in Nigeria and undermined the harmonious community life that had been forged through patient relationship building over a long period.

"Senseless killing and destruction of human life and property must not continue. Bombs and guns can neither create a harmonious society nor lead to a peaceful existence," Junge added. In a 16 January pastoral letter to the Lutheran Church of Christ in Nigeria and the Lutheran Church of Nigeria, LWF President Bishop Dr Munib A. Younan urged churches in the West African country to continue to work for forgiveness and reconciliation.

"Remain steadfast in your calling. Remain committed to sharing God's love with all. Overcome evil with good, so that extremism is given no opportunity to control or intimidate," he wrote.

Younan, bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land, noted that "attacks that use religion for political ends show disregard for the universal human right of the freedom of religion and are opposed to all standards of international law and stand in opposition against the teachings of all religion."

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with 7.1 million and Sweden with 6.5 million. Ethiopia and Tanzania each have some 5.8 million Lutherans.

### **Africa**

In Africa, membership in the 31 churches belonging to the LWF grew in 2011 to reach 19,867,743 members. The number of non-LWF Lutheran members on the continent declined by 14,867 members to 184,830, or 7.4 percent.

Among the LWF member churches in Africa showing growth were two smaller churches, the Evangelical Lutheran Church of the Central African Republic, which recorded a 94 percent increase for its current 107,000 members. The Evangelical Lutheran Church in Malawi noted a 25 percent increase, giving it 100,000 members.

### Asia

The 52 LWF member churches in Asia reported an increase, to reach a total of 9,020,850 members. Membership outside the LWF-affiliated churches grew by 7,448 (3.9 percent) to 198,552 members.

The Christian Protestant Church in Indonesia recorded 587,985 members in 2011, a 63.4 percent increase, while the Protestant Christian Church in Mentawai grew by 28.5 percent to 50,000 members. Indonesia retains a strong Lutheran presence with more than 5.8 million Lutherans in the 12 LWF member churches.

### **Europe**

While Europe is home to almost half of the world's Lutherans, the 43 LWF member churches there recorded 396,133 fewer members in the past year, around one percent, to reach 36.3 million members. Membership in churches that are not affiliated to the LWF in Europe declined to count 78,934.

The Latvian Evangelical Lutheran Church Abroad (in Germany) added 830 members, a growth of 3.3 percent, bringing its total to 25,850 members. The Federation of Evangelical Lutheran Churches in Switzerland and the Principality of Liechtenstein recorded an additional 150 members, an increase of 2.2 percent to reach a total of 7,040 members. A 6.7 percent decline or 5,000 members in the Evangelical Church of the Augsburg Confession in Poland brought the membership to 70,000.

The countries with the highest number of Lutherans on the continent continued to show a decline in membership. Germany's 14 LWF member churches declined by 124,437, nearly one percent, while Church of Sweden recorded a drop of 111,023 members, or 1.6 percent.

# Latin America and the Caribbean

Membership in the 16 churches belonging to the LWF in Latin America and the Caribbean declined slightly in 2011, reporting 507 fewer members and a current membership of 846,432. Non-LWF churches recorded a loss of 820 members.

The region's largest Lutheran church, the Evangelical Church of the Lutheran Confession in Brazil, counted 717,127, a slight increase from the previous year.

### **North America**

The three LWF member churches in North America posted a membership decrease of 274,265, or 5.8 percent, to 4,425,635 members.

The region's largest Lutheran church, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, lost 270,349 members, or 5.95 percent, down to 4,272,688 members. The Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada declined by 3,916, or 2.6 percent, bringing its current membership to 144,947 members.

The LWF membership statistics are based on information received by late February 2012 from the LWF member churches, recognized churches and congregations and council that are affiliated to the LWF, as well as from other Lutheran bodies. Figures recorded for the preceding year were used for churches that did not indicate if there were any changes. In the future, this survey will be conducted every two years.

## Youth the Key to Peace in South Sudan

LWF Supporting Peace Process Launched by Sudan Council of Churches

JUBA, South Sudan/GENEVA (LWI) – Ask almost anyone in South Sudan today what the key to peace is and most will have the same answer—youth.

Accurate numbers of the population in South Sudan are difficult to obtain, but it is estimated that over half the population is under 18. Although there is a high rate of literacy among adolescents—up to 90 percent—an unemployment rate of over 30 percent combined with the fact that many young people grew up during a civil war means violence has become the norm.

The cattle-rearing culture in Sudan exacerbates the problem of violence among youth. It is the youth in the cattle camps that have been behind the most recent wave of violence. Children as young as seven are sent to the camps to look after cattle. The camps contain thousands of stock forming a sea of white that reaches the horizon. Like a movable village, the camps contain schools and churches and other basic infrastructure.

As so many young people live and move around in the cattle camps, it has been difficult to engage them in the peace process, especially as the camps are in remote rural areas.

Since 2010, The Lutheran World Federation (LWF) through its Department for World Service (DWS) has been reaching out to young people with a peace building program that aims to end practices like cattle rustling, arson and child abduction in South Sudan.

The messages of the program are simple: don't follow cattle when they are stolen, don't steal cattle from others and keep peace among each other. Until now, the LWF program has

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been working among Dinka, who accept these messages but who also say that if the other tribes do not share these messages, then violence will continue and there will be no peace.

Mary Obara, LWF South Sudan program coordinator, says that, "Peace initiatives in Duk and Twic East [towns in Jonglei State] have yielded results. The rate of violence is lower in these camps but, unfortunately, the messages do not protect the youth from those in other camps who continue raiding their cattle and burning their villages."

Obara says she knows of one man who mobilized 6,000 youth alone to raid cattle and burn villages. "If one man is able to mobilize a huge crowd, it means they have a huge following and are listened to," she said.

In Twic East, the LWF has organized sports tournaments for the youth. "It pulls everyone together. Football and volleyball are hugely popular," says Obara.

Another popular sport in South Sudan is wrestling. "This year we are looking at the wrestling tournaments as a way to reach the youth and as a forum to preach peace," she says.

Although the LWF has been reaching out to young people, youth have been missing from the mainstream peace process until now.

Churches are beginning to take the lead in actively engaging the youth of South Sudan in the peace process and the bishops representing the Sudan Council of Churches on 20 January in Juba announced a peace process to address the current wave of violence. The LWF is funding part of this process and the bishops have released a joint statement about "The Current Situation in Jonglei State," outlining their plan.

"The Church has a mandate from Jesus Christ to bring peace to the world," they said in the statement. The two-track process entails political leadership at a high level and a grassroots process. Many of those affected by the most recent waves of violence think peaceful dialogue is part of the resolution. However, any dialogue must include the youth.

John Ashworth, Sudan Advisor to the Sudan Ecumenical Forum, said that the uneven distribution of aid had contributed to the conflict. In collaboration with the ACT Alliance, the LWF has chosen to focus on reaching people in remote areas of the Jonglei State.

After five decades of violence, everyone in South Sudan will need to make an effort to nurture peace and as the future of the country peace won't last without the participation of Sudanese youth.

# DWS Certification Shows People at Center of Humanitarian Response

The Lutheran World Federation (LWF) General Secretary Rev. Martin Junge called the organization's certification by a global quality assurance body a milestone for the communion of churches.

The Humanitarian Accountability Partnership (HAP) International announced on 17 January that the LWF had achieved certification against the 2010 Standard in Accountability and Quality Management, which seeks to ensure that the power of humanitarian actors is exercised responsibly with regard to disaster-affected communities.

"The certification underlines the LWF's commitment to the values of accountability and transparency as expressed in the LWF Strategy 2012-2017," said Junge. "At the same time it deepens the notion of accountability by providing a strong focus to the people the LWF works with."

The certification by the humanitarian community's foremost independent self-regulatory body covers all activities—including advocacy, development work and emergency preparedness and response—implemented by the LWF Department for World Service (DWS). It follows audits of DWS Geneva and DWS Nepal in November and December 2011 respectively, and is valid for three years.

The multi-agency initiative noted that only two corrective actions were needed and affirmed "the dedication and hard

work of [LWF] management and staff" which had made possible "this major achievement."

DWS Director Rev. Eberhard Hitzler said the HAP certification offered an external confirmation that the LWF is serving people in need in the best possible way by putting them at the center of its actions.

"The HAP certification has motivated all of us to constantly reflect and improve our strategy and action to ensure that people in need are accompanied and their rights respected and upheld," he remarked.

Maryssa Camaddo, LWF/DWS Program Officer for Quality and Accountability, noted the HAP certification process had been a learning process.

"Being accountable to the people we work with helps develop quality programs that meet the people's rights and needs, and reduces the possibility of any abuse or corruption," said Camaddo. "Accountability processes that are managed effectively help organizations to perform better," she added.

# LWF Assistance to Southern Sudanese Fleeing Violence after Cattle Raids

In January, humanitarian organizations including The Lutheran World Federation (LWF) added emergency aid programs to their ongoing work in South Sudan to respond to the impact of inter-ethnic violence as a result of cattle raids. Until then, the LWF Department for World Service (DWS) community development work in the eastern state of Jonglei included peace-building campaigns targeting youth living in the cattle camps with a goal to ending cattle raids.

The thousands who fled their communities following the violent cattle raids received emergency food rations, water,

hygienic items and other non-food items. Critical during such emergencies is the prevention of diseases like cholera and other gastro-intestinal illnesses that cause diarrhea. The LWF therefore provided soap and constructed pit latrines to prevent disease. Health teams on the ground screened people and referred the sick for treatment.
